Meet Police Chief, Jerry Smith

By the age of sixteen, Jerry Smith knew he was destined to spend his life in law enforcement. A simple chat with an Oregon State Trooper opened his mind to a whole new world that sounded like the place he wanted to live. He was born to a military family stationed at Camp Pendleton, California. After his father retired from the Marine Corps, the family moved to the small town of Coburg, Oregon. By the way, while in High School, Jerry Smith dated the daughter of the State Trooper who so influenced his life. He attended Coburg schools until his freshman year and went on to graduate from Sheldon High School at seventeen.

Four days after graduation, like his father before him, he joined the Marine Corps. Jerry Smith spent a total of four years in the service with thirteen months of it in Vietnam.

One day after he became Chief, his friend and colleague, retired Chief Bill DeForrest stopped to visit and noticed some photographs on the wall and the terrain looked very familiar. After years of friendship and working together, they discovered they had served in the same war zone in Vietnam, close to the same time. Once discharged from the military he completed his education earning his Bachelors and Master's Degrees from the University of Oregon. Although Jerry Smith was very aware of the stresses of police work he saw the potential to be of help to the community. He joined the Springfield Police Department in 1970. In 1975 he and his wife Sheila were married and to make their life complete along came their son Michael. Patrol Officer Smith rose in the ranks to Captain and became Chief Jerry Smith in 1999.

Being very proud of his son's accomplishments in the field of sports, Chief Smith enjoys coaching basketball on any given Saturday.

Coaching children has been both fulfilling and fun for him as kids enjoy being challenged. Having received his pilot license in 1978 he loves to fly the friendly skies whenever he can make the time.

It's clear that Sheila, Michael and daughter-in-law Alicia are his passion, but so is his job. His accomplishments are many and thoughts of Springfield's citizens are always in his vision. He welcomes speaking opportunities and observes the open door policy. He has great respect for Springfield and its citizens and I might add the respect is reciprocated. TEXT MESSAGING SCAM

The Medford Police Department Financial Investigation Section has received reports of a text message scam (phishing scam). The scam is saying "as part of its protection program, call us at 559-XXX-XXXX to verify your account."

The Medford Police Department is advising that this is a **scam** and there is no reason to respond to this text message. Do not call the number on the text message.

The Bank of the Cascades is the bank targeted in this scam. Bank of the Cascades advised they do not conduct business via text messages. The Bank of the Cascades security division believes this scam is being generated from outside the United States.

DUMB CRIMINAL STORIES

Yankton, South Dakota: A woman was arrested at her stepson's Boy Scout meeting. While watching a policeman demonstrate his drug dog's ability, the dog found a bag of grass in her purse.

Colorado Springs: A guy walked into a little corner store with a shotgun and demanded all the cash from the cash drawer. After the cashier put the cash in a bag, the robber saw a bottle of scotch that he wanted behind the counter on the shelf. He told the cashier to put it in the bag as well, but he refused and said, "Because I don't believe you are over 21." The robber said he was, but the clerk still refused to give it to him because he didn't believe him. At this point the robber took his drivers license out of his wallet and gave it to the clerk. K9 Korner

Officer Keetle and K9 Bronko joined a vehicle pursuit started by Officer Myers and Sgt. Rappe. Eventually the car stopped and the driver fled on foot. Bronko was given the command to apprehend the driver but when Bronko reached the suspect he tried to grab his arm and missed. This slowed the suspect down and Brian quickly caught up to him and did not miss when he tackled the suspect. When the suspect attempted to get away from Brian, Bronko grabbed the suspect on the leg and the suspect was eventually taken into custody.

Officer Simmons and K9 Fedo responded to assist Officer Kirkpatrick with a subject who was fleeing from a stolen vehicle. The suspect was thought to be heard running through a slough. Fedo was taken to the location where the suspect was heard and he picked up a track that led into a backyard. Mark gave an announcement for anyone in the backyard to come out and receiving no response sent Fedo in to search. Within a short time Fedo located the suspect and held on to him until Mark arrived. The suspect was charged with numerous crimes including UUV and Resisting Arrest.

Officer Kendrick and K9 Cyrill assisted Officer Grice in a pursuit that led them to Eugene. When the pursuit ended, the driver fled. The driver was chased for a short distance by a EPD officer who lost sight of him. Cyrill quickly picked up the track and followed it down an alley and into a back yard. The track was lost for a short time but picked up again and it led into an apartment complex. In the parking lot of the complex Cyrill picked up airborne scent which led him to a vehicle. At the vehicle Cyrill stopped and began barking. Daren observed a male, later identified as the driver, laying under the vehicle. He was taken into custody without incident.

Officer DelCastillo and K9 Creck responded to Marcola to assist the Sheriff's Office with a Robbery. Upon their arrival they were shown the location the suspect was last seen running. Creck quickly picked up the track and followed it for blocks as it went down Marcola Rd., into a back yard, across another street and to the door of a camp trailer parked in a back yard. A light was on in the trailer and a Deputy made contact with a male occupant. After talking to the person, the Deputy believed the male wasn't involved. Creck attempted to pick up another track but indicated there was no other track. Investigators at the scene developed a name of a possible suspect. When a photo of that person was obtained it was the male at the trailer. Deputies returned to the trailer and eventually recovered the money and gun and arrested the male for Robbery.



Citizen Police Academy—Spring 2009

Now Accepting Applications

Deadline for Applications: March 6, 2009!

The Springfield Police Department is inviting applicants to attend its Citizen Police Academy. Applicants must be 18 years or older. Preference will be given to Springfield residents and people doing business in Springfield. The academy course is designed for citizens from all backgrounds or occupations.

The Springfield Citizen Police Academy is a long established and important police/community relations program. It is designed to provide citizens with a better understanding of the nature of police work and to interact with department members in a non-emergency setting. It is also an opportunity for citizens to provide input on police policy, practice and procedure.

The 33-hour training program consists of classroom and "hands-on" instruction. Topics covered include the officer selection and training process, the job of the uniformed patrol officer, investigation skills, tactical operation, the canine unit, use of firearms, vice and narcotics, communications, crime scene search, and crime prevention. Students will be actively involved in many interesting activities, such as touring police facilities, using police equipment, and firing the department-issued weapons.

Graduates of this course will not be police officers, but will be better-informed citizens. The graduates will be in a position to relate their experiences to friends, and co-workers.

The course is free. Each applicant must answer each question on the application form. To graduate, each student must attend at least nine of the eleven classes. Therefore, prior to applying, applicants must determine whether or not they can attend the minimum number of classes for graduation.
